From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,

Where Karen and I lived in Ohio for the past six years, the sun sets 45 minutes later each day than it does in the West Brookfield area. For me, the earlier sunsets here at this time of year accentuate the darkness of the impending winter season. Coupled with what seems to be a spiritual darkness pervading many aspects of our life in our nation, that physical darkness might threaten to immerse our souls in sadness, or even depression.

More than ever, then, for Christians the journey through the season of Advent can be an uplifting journey of hope, as well as a journey of moving toward the light and love of God that we celebrate at Christmas. I would like to encourage us, as individuals and as a community of faith, to take that journey this year with intentionality, reflecting regularly on God's gift to us of Jesus and, in anticipation of celebrating that gift at Christmas, finding time to share the fruits of that gift—light, love, laughter, and gratitude—with others in the days ahead.

Dear Ms. Molloy and Mr. Russell,

I am writing to you with an invitation to make a positive difference in the communities of West Brookfield and Warren, Massachusetts. Our church, The First Congregational Church of West Brookfield, works to sustain the bodies and spirits of our congregation, our local community, and the world beyond. We like to think of ourselves as small but mighty. We multiply all of our individual member contributions, whether donated funds or time and talent, to achieve big results. We are grateful for your generous contributions in the past, and hope to hear from you again. Would you be so kind as to help fund our work in 2026 with a donation from the J. Irving England Charitable Trust?

We've been working very hard over the past year. Here are some highlights for 2025:

We have called a new minister, after a two-year search process, and are very excited to now have the Reverend Dr. Douglas Williamson leading our congregation. Doug brings a wealth of experience, leading churches in Ohio, Nebraska, and Vermont, in addition to a long and rich academic teaching and soccer coaching career. He and his wife Karen are settling into New England life and are eager to bring their knowledge and talents to enrich our community.

Our Missions Committee carefully researched charities and provided support to worthy causes at the local, national, and international level. In the central Massachusetts area, we made contributions to a variety of local organizations, including the Dismas Farm, Springfield Rescue Mission, Worcester Fellowship, Abby's House, and Camp Putnam. We also host dinners with the residents of the Dismas Farm at the church every other month, providing personal connection and social time for the residents. Our congregation includes a number of veterans, so contributions were made to Holy Joe's Café and Home Front Strong to support our troops during and after deployment. Reaching beyond the United States, the Missions Committee provided funding to Saving Orphans Nationally and Globally (SONG); Global Ministries; and the United Church of Christ's international work.

The Sharing Cupboard Food Pantry, housed in the basement of the church, serves local families in the communities of West Brookfield, Warren, and West Warren. Each month, between 70 and 85 families are served by the Sharing Cupboard, which is one of the only food pantries in the area with multiple pickup days and evening hours. This flexibility better enables working families to access food assistance. Early in 2025, with the full support of the church, the Sharing Cupboard underwent a major renovation and expansion in anticipation of increased food insecurity. An unused large classroom in the church basement was offered as additional space to the Sharing Cupboard. The floor was cleaned and repaired; the walls were freshly painted; and a new doorway was cut to connect the old pantry space with the new space. An adjustable ramp was built in a bulkhead with stairs, allowing cases of food from the Worcester County Food Bank to be unloaded quickly and safely onto carts that can be moved to the shelves. New shelving and refrigerators and freezers were purchased, doubling the amount of food storage space. The expanded space for food storage has allowed the Sharing Cupboard to take full advantage of the food pickups from the Worcester County Food Bank as well as doing more food drives within the West Brookfield community.

Our new high-efficiency heat pump system, installed in the fall of 2023, has performed well for both heating and cooling. We are working with Interfaith Power and Light to write up our decision-making process and experience as a case study. In addition, Mass Save and National Grid are installing sensors and data loggers to measure real time usage data through the heating season. Results of this study will be used to assist other churches and businesses to make more informed decisions about viable options for heating systems.

We also intentionally and thoughtfully continue to increase our presence in the local community, beyond our congregation. In addition to participating in the Asparagus Festival in the spring and hosting the Flea Market on the Common in late summer, we offer space to the West Brookfield Winter Farmers Market. Each week many local farmers set up a mini-market in our fellowship hall and invite the public in to shop for locally produced meat, vegetables, baked goods, and other products. We will of course be a key part of the White Christmas in West Brookfield celebration on December 7, with a bake table with homemade treats, a bucket raffle and our very tasty open-faced turkey sandwiches.

We really hope the J. Irving England Charitable Trust can help fund our work in 2026. We are grateful for your generous contributions in the past, and hope to hear from you again. Thank you for your consideration!

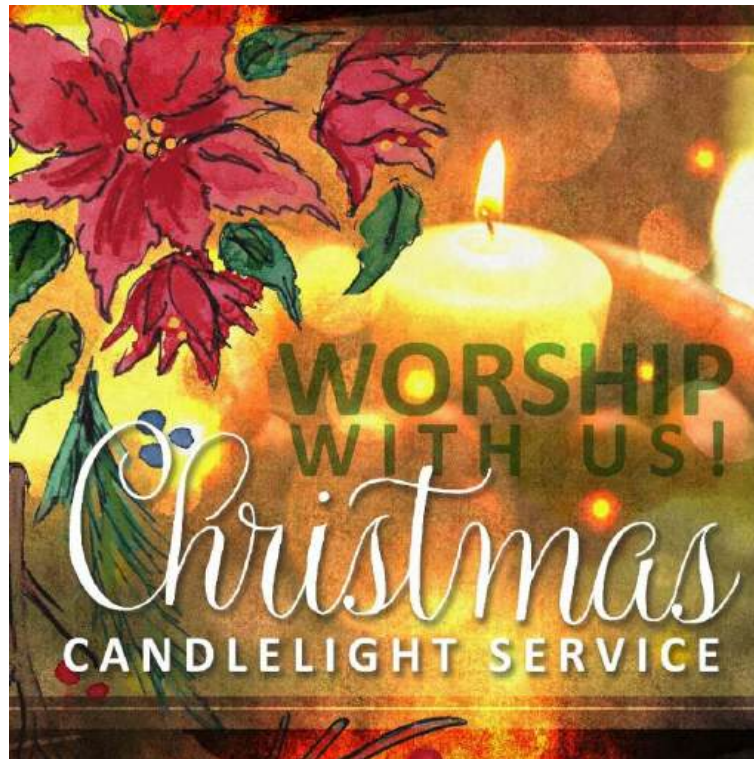
